It is the timber shining from the super fine abrading. **There is no finish on the wood**. Because of this the timber will dull in a short period of time from moisture in the air, steam, humidity, etc. This is because the timber is **still raw**. If it gets wet it will dull off instantly.

Use a finish over the top preferably one of the Shellawaxes, which are 100% compatible with the EEE..
