### The Beall Buffing System

The Hamilton Woodturners' Club, like many other clubs, has a BEALL system for putting an impressive shine on turned projects.


Our kit containing all the buffing system parts is stored in a single container and is available each session for members' use.

This brief paper provides information about how to get the best results from the **Beall System** 



- 1. When using the 8" wheels set the speed to No. 5 pulley (Nova 3000)
- 2. If using the smaller mops on boxes or small bowls, goblets etc a faster speed can be used (pulley 6/7) It is the peripheral speed that is important, not the rotational speed.
- 3. As with a grinding wheel, the wheel should be travelling **DOWNWARDS** at the point where you contact it with the work.
- 4. Begin the process with the Tripoli Buff and the red Tripoli compound. Apply a generous amount of compound to the spinning wheel. Begin buffing your workpiece, holding it slightly below the centre of the wheel so that it cannot "grab" the piece.
- 5. For the next step, change the wheels, mounting the White Diamond Buff, which is used with the harder, drier, White Diamond Compound. Apply a small amount of the White Diamond compound to the wheel and buff the workpiece lightly: this will remove the residue left from the Tripoli and also provide the final polishing.
- 6. Finally the wax coat is applied using the Wax Buff. The wax included with the kit is pure Carnauba Wax, which is an edible vegetable wax and therefore ideal for finishing domestic items. Once the wheel has been charged with the yellow Carnauba Wax a few times, only a light application will be needed on each subsequent use. Hold the wax to the wheel for no more than a second as an excess of wax will impair, rather than improve, the finish. Buff the workpiece lightly to produce a beautiful protective sheen.
- 7. When using the 8" wheels set the speed to No. 5 pulley (Nova 3000)


#### What's happening in our workshop?

Staying highly focused and with sustained concentration **MIKE** takes special care of a particularly attractive piece of matai wood. Another treasure on its way.




As a new turner this year **CHRIS** has taken to woodturning as a duck might to water. Well done Chris, your candle holder project is one of the best produced in the past three years.
