

- 1. Our new drill press has arrived and awaits a couple of good keen people to assemble it including safety-securing the machine to the floor with suitable dyna bolts. An impact (hammer) drill and masonry bit will be needed. Any offers?
- 2. The dust extractor unit has been thoroughly cleaned and is back to operating at normal efficiency.
- 3. The big bandsaw awaits its new ripping blade. In the meantime I have fitted a "rounds-cutting" blade for members to use. Remember to turn on the dust extractor whenever the band saws are in use and always wear ear and eye protection.
- 4. Great to see members remembering to clean the air filters at the end of each session and also easing lathe belt tensions defore leaving the workshop. These important practices ensure our safety equipment continues to operate effectively and the lathe belts have an extended life. Many thanks for your attention and help. Excellent!

#### MORE THINKING ABOUT REALLY USEFUL AND BASIC ITEMS FOR YOR TOOL BOXES




Maximizing your turning time during a normal session. The SCOUTS organization has been using a motto probably for more than a hundred years - BE PREPARED

These wise words apply to just about anything we do. Members can use up a lot of time and energy moving about the workshop fetching and returning basic items to use. Maximize your time by having your own basic items right beside you ready for use.

Also, in keeping with the theme **BE PREPARED**, I strongly suggest you align your lathe as soon as you arrive and ensure that the bowl gouges in the tool rack are sharp and ready to go.

Tool boxes such as this can be bought cheaply from Bunnings. Excellent for storing all your basic items.



Everything in the top picture cost about \$15. (The sanding arbors are home made)

#### **SOME BASIC ITEMS**

- A measuring ruler
- sharp pencils (B+)
- felt-tip pens (cheap as.... from the \$2 shop)
- A roll of electrician's insulating tape
- sanding disks 80 to 600 grit
- sanding arbors
- two-pot glue
- tubes of super glue
- a piece of scrap formica
- a wing compass
- scissors
- small paint brushes
- a safety knife
- a protractor
- pot of EEE
- a few clean rags

All of which can be stored in a small hobby tool box.



NOTE: Many of our members already have a kit of basic turning-support tools. Have you got yours yet?

**ROBERT** found this piece of interesting wood while on a recent hunting trip.


A huckery chunk was found on a beach and, as yet, the wood has not been identified, so until then it's a turning made from "beech" wood.

The turning has been expertly crafted releasing an array of beautiful colours.

**MURRAY's** black walnut turning features an embellishment of dremel tool dots to add interest to the outer surface.

An exhibition of patience and careful work was needed to complete the job.

To help you make decisions about useful tools you might bring with you to help the team, the intended tasks are outlined as follows:

Clean the air filters. Needed: (Vacuum cleaner or small compressor to blow air)

Assemble the new drill press: Needed: Four 10mm dyna bolts, spanners, hammer drill

And 10mm masonry bit

Make a set of shelves: Needed: skill saw for ripping and cross cutting, **75mm nails** 

**20mm flathead nails, tape measure and pencil,** hammers and

carpentry skills

Removal of lathe bearing: Needed: a bit of engineering knowhow, **new bearing kit** 

Remove old drill press: Spanners and muscle

Clean out storage cupboard: Needed: an organized mind and a team approach, hooks for

hanging things on

Tidy the tea/coffee area: Needed: scrubbing mits, cleaners, rags

Where parts are needed, (shown above in RED) the committee will purchase these and have them ready for action.

Many hands will make light of the work so your attendance at this WORKING BEE will be most welcome.

Please bring any tools you think might be useful to attend the tasks listed above.
