### A BASIC TOOL KIT FOR WOODTURNERS

Clive's basic list.

You may wish to add your own ideas too!

Now you have been turning for a while and learning the basic skills of woodturning, it is very likely you have started compiling a TOOL KIT. Almost every time you work at the lathe you will need to reach into your tool box, bag or wheeled contraption to fetch some "tool" to help you with the project. Having your own gear will maximize your time at each session.

A WOODTURNER'S BASIC TOOL KIT. The items in this kit are HIGH FREQUENCY tools.

While some of the items on this list cost just a few dollars and others quite a few dollars more, there are many items you can **make or buy with little or no expense.** Having said that, the very first item I suggest you consider buying is a good quality lathe **CHUCK fitted with standard 50mm jaws.** (35mm jaws might come later) Terry Scott of TIMBERLY TURNING is a good place to start your shopping

However the Club chucks are available for you to use, but there are occasions when you need to leave your work in the chuck and continue the project next session. Removal of turning work then re-chucking at the next session usually results in disheartening wobbly wood. So having your own chuck is a big advantage. Chucks are expensive and need to be matched to the lathe you have at home or at your Hamilton Woodturners Club, or to the lathe you intend purchasing one lucky day. A well-checked-out second-hand CHUCK is absolutely OK. If your dollars stretch far enough a **Supernova2** will last you a lifetime.

The actual container for the kit is a personal choice and could be a sturdy carry bag, or box, or a trolley that's easy to move about. OK here's a suggested list of items for your tool kit.

- 1. A good quality CHUCK (and maybe exchange inserts if you work on lathes with different sized spindle shafts)
- 2. **"2B" pencil** (cheap at the \$2 shop) A flat, traditional carpenters pencil is brilliant!

- 3. A stick of chalk (for visualizing your turning ideas on a mini board)
- 4. Fine tip, spirit, felt-tip markers
- 5. 300mm strip of old steel tape (cut up and old steel measure)
- 6. 6" Calipers (internal and external capable)
- 7. **Astra dot sanding disks. (Buying by the rolls is cheapest)** "Abranet" sheets are excellent for hand sanding.
- 8. Super glue (from the \$2 shop they have a short shelf life so don't buy too many)
- 9. A small quantity of epoxy resin mix (cheap at Bunnings in two small tubes A and B)
- 10. Clean rags. Old bath towels are the very best type of rag.
- 11.A sharp safety knife (\$2 Shop again)
- 12.**A pot of EEE compound**. (We know it as "triple E")
- 13. Your favourite wood finish (Wax? Polish? Oil?)
- 14.A pair of scissors (cheap at the \$2 shop)
- 15. Three different sized sanding arbors (these can be easily made)
- 16.A centre finder that locates the bead centre of the round (easily made)
- 17. Wing compass from the \$2 shop or make your own for almost no cost
- 18.A range of screws for holding faceplates to your wood. (The club has plenty)
- 19.A square-tip screwdriver to fit the screws. (Cheap at Bunnings or Handtool House)

It's a good idea to keep all these small items in a clear plastic container to prevent them getting lost in the bottom of your tool kit.

- 20.A 13mm bowl gouge (You can make you own during one of your development projects)
- 21.A power drill for sanding (not cordless) Light weight and variable speed is VG. The TOOLSHED is a good place to shop [ 0 2500 rpm, 550 watt, 10mm, keyless chuck, lightweight]
- 22.A set of **BRAD POINT** wood drill bits. (*Metric* before *Imperial* but having both is an advantage)

- 23. Specialist tools. (Scrapers, dovetail chisel both can be made!)
- 24.Small mini bowl gouges (6mm). Check out garage sales for bargains. Shape your own tips!
- 25. Purpose-built chisels and gouges. (Examples being the EASY wood tools but they are expensive)

#### **SAFETY EQUIPMENT**

- 26. Face mask / helmet / sturdy footwear
- 27.Respirator devices. A simple cloth mouth/nose mask or a powered model
- 28. Protective clothing e.g neck-high light jackets. (NZ Safety shops have these)

**Build your BASIC TOOL KIT over time.** Affordability is often the enemy, but as stated earlier, many items can be made, thus reducing expenses or they can be purchased with minimal cost.
